This program is an innovative initiative by Taiwan AID and marks the first time Taiwan has brought together numerous NGOs for a collaborative training effort.

In the past, Taiwan has a history of receiving international assistance. We are eager to share our valuable experiences and accomplishments in NGO development with the global community. Taiwan's transformation is notable – from its authoritarian past, the end of martial law in 1987 led to a flourishing of NGOs. Numerous professionals sought opportunities to study and gain practical experience in countries such as Europe and the United States. WHO WE ARE



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OVERVIEW OF NGO FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

About the Fellowship

The NGO Fellowship Program provides opportunities for NGO professionals from South Asia and Southeast Asia to gain first-hand experience in the Taiwanese NGO sector. The one-month-long fellowship contains an NGO placement, workshop, and roundtable event with their Taiwanese counterparts.

Key Program Features

NGO Placement:

Fellows will be placed in Taiwan's NGO according to their professional backgrounds. Fellows will work with the Taiwanese NGO and engage in daily operations for three weeks. Depending on the nature of the NGOs, fellows will engage in event preparation, project management, or fundraising activities.

Capacity building:

Fellows will attend a four-day workshop at the start of the program. The workshop aims at project management, fundraising, and advocacy. Fellows will also visit civil society sites related to Taiwan civil society.

Roundtable event:

Fellows will join a roundtable event on the sixth day of the program. The fellows and Taiwanese NGO professionals will together share their practical experience and upto-date observation in the field.

• Future project collaboration:

Fellows will be expected to propose a project draft at the end of the program for future cooperation in their home countries. The program will provide opportunities for fellows and host NGOs to explore the possibility of future cooperation.

CHARACTERIZING CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS IN TAIWAN: HISTORY, TYPOLOGY, AND ACTIVISM



Hsin-Huang Michael Hsiao Chairman, Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation

Hsin-Huang Michael Hsiao is the Adjunct Research Fellow of Institute of Sociology in Academia Sinica, Taiwan; Chairman of both Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation (TAEF) and the Executive Committee of Center for Southeast Asian Studies (CSEAS), National Cheng-Chi University; and Senior Advisor to the President of Taiwan since 2016. He is also the Chair Professor of Hakka Studies,

National Central University and Honorary Chair Professor of Southeast Asian Studies, National Chi-Nan International University. Internationally, he is the chairman of both the Consortium of Southeast Asian Studies in Asia (SEASIA) and Consortium of Global Hakka Studies (GHAS).

Course Description:

Introduction: 1. Clarification of various related concepts: NGO, NPO, the third sector, social force, voluntary sector, civil society (organization) (CSO), public sphere (realm). 2. All concepts more or less point to one central issue of the relations between "society" and "state" in an organizational form, and those organizations are outside "business" and "state".



"ZHIBENIZM": THE KIDS' BOOKHOUSE

Chen, Yen-Han

Chairman/CEO, Kids' Bookhouse.



Yen-Han Chen was born in 1991. He is the eldest son of Mr. Chen Jun-lang ("Chen Pa"), the founder of Kids' Bookhouse. Yen-Han graduated from the Department of Economic and Financial Law, NUK. He was selected as the Becoming ACES in 2022. He is dedicated to education and regional revitalization.

Course Description:

For 24 years, Kids' Bookhouse has been taking care of the children in the Zhiben area who are unfairly treated by families, communities, and schools due to their vulnerability. We hope to "give back to children the rights that they simply just being a happy child." Thinking as a father or as a mother, Kids' Bookhouse insists on building a complete support system no matter the cost.

The social and educational work currently being carried out for the disadvantaged in the region not only aims to improve academics and careers but also carries out education in the form of nation-building; it aims to make structural changes with the aim of breaking through the predicament of capitalism and try to create the next In this era of people getting along with each other, there are new possibilities -" Zhibenizm"



NGO CROWDFUNDING STRATEGY

Rikash Lin
Co-Founder & CEO, Calls Over Ridges

Start up: Co founded Calls over Ridges, aims to guide children through education by incubating educational NGOs throughout Asia. (2015)

Educational impact : Created a system to provide long-term, quality education for kids at the epicenter of the 2015 Nepal earthquake, bringing 8,000 underprivileged students back to school. (2015~2018), expanded operation to the Philippines and Sabah (2023)

Fundraising: Recruited 5500 regular donors via 7 crowdfunding events in 7 years. (2015~2022)

Leadership: Empowered Nepali young leaders to take over by establishing an education NGO. (2015~2018)

Innovation: Initiated an online incubation program to empower young leaders from Vietnam, Indonesia, Cambodia, and Myanmar, by providing participant-centered workshops, mentor sessions, and kick-off funds. (2020~2022)

Throughout the course, we'll uncover essential elements like defining your target audience, selecting the right marketing channels, crafting promotional strategies, and creating compelling marketing content.

PUBLIC DIPLOMACY IN THE DIGITAL AGE

Chiayo Kuo is the founder and president of the Taiwan Digital Diplomacy Association, an independent NGO dedicated to enhancing Taiwan's visibility through public diplomacy. Chiayo also serves as a member of the International Affairs Committee of the Taiwan Network Information Center, the National Human Rights Commission of the Ministry of the Interior, and the board of Radio Taiwan International.

Course Description:

With the rapid development of digital technologies and the transformation of international affairs in the digital era, it is crucial for non-profit organizations to leverage digital platforms to increase visibility and connect with global audiences. For the past four years, the Taiwan Digital Diplomacy Association (TDDA) has been devoted to increasing Taiwan's international visibility through public diplomacy. It has launched collaborative projects with more than 25 countries, including Vietnam, Kosovo, and the United States.

Yet, what the next steps will be and the transformation of International Affairs in the post-COVID era? How can non-profit organizations leverage digital tools to advance their objectives and enhance their impact? During this speech, I will share insights on executing international projects in the digital age. By embracing digital strategies, non-profit organizations can better achieve their goals and create a more significant global impact.





Ingrid Yeh

Supervisor, International Affairs Department, The Garden of Hope Foundation

Ingrid currently serves as the Supervisor of International Affairs Department in the Garden of Hope Foundation, which is the largest women's organization in Taiwan, Executive Board Member of Global Network of Women's Shelters, Secretariat of Asian Network of Women's Shelters, founding member of Asia Network to End GBV, and the organizer of Asian Girls Campaign.

Course Description:

The vision of the Garden of Hope Foundation is "A World Free from Gender-based violence." This 35-year-old women's organization in Taiwan provides services mainly for three causes: "Sexual Assault," "Intimate Partner Violence," and "Children's Rights." Over the years, the Garden of Hope Foundation has insisted that advocacy and service go together. Advocacy is not only dialogue with the government for a sound gender-equal legal structure, but also dialogue with the general public for gender education. The myth, discrimination and unfriendliness of the society towards gender-based violence usually cause further harm and stigma to the victims, which requires continuous active communication and education.

This workshop will use the experience of the Garden of Hope Foundation in advocating in Taiwan as an example to share with the participants. Through productive discussions, participants will be able to share with each other what works in advocacy and come up with solutions to challenges encountered during advocacy.

Kevin Chen is the founder and CEO of One-Forty, which is a non-profit organization committed to Southeast Asian migrant worker issues. He has worked at the CSBIX design studio with a specialization in Creating Shared Value, which helps companies to solve social issues. He was one of the founders of social media "Career for Change," and a long-time participant of the social activities aimed to "flip jobs." He graduated from the Department of Business Administration, National Chengchi University, and was an exchange student at Guanghua School of Management, Peking University. He joined a 3-month slum care project in India, and also helped with community counseling in Mianyang of Sichuan after the Wenchuan Earthquake.

Medical Mission Center of Changhua Christian
Hospital and the Executive Director of Taiwan AID Board
Members, the international cooperation alliance of Taiwan's
NGOs. Dr. Nina is a professional international project manager
and has been devoting herself to international works for more than
15 years. She dedicated to mobilize the public and private sectors' resources to
conduct the international program in developing countries. Dr. Nina also concerns
about the development effectiveness and effective cooperation development. She
joined the regional networking of CPDE (CSOs Partnership for Development and
Effectiveness) to organize the workshop for CSOs in Taiwan to promote Enabling
Environment, SDGs implementation, transparency, and accountability.

Course Description:

Project Cycle Management (PCM) is the term given to the process of planning and managing projects, programs and organizations. It is used widely in the business sector and is increasingly being used by development organizations. Development projects sometimes fail because they are badly planned and do not take account of some important factors, particularly the needs and views of stakeholders. PCM is based around a project cycle, which ensures that all aspects of projects are considered. A central value of the PCM method is that aspects of the project are reconsidered throughout the project cycle to ensure that any changes which have occurred are included in the project design. As a result, projects are more likely to be successful and sustainable.

Joyce Teng is the Executive Director of Taiwan Equality Campaign (previously known as "Marriage Equality Coalition Taiwan".) Before Taiwan Equality Campaign, she participated in some activist groups focusing on different issues like environment protection, women rights and transformational justice since 2010, and served as the Legislative assistant for the parliament of Taiwan between 2013 to 2015, and then dedicated herself to same-sex marriage legalization since 2016.

Joyce holds M.L. of National Taiwan University. With experience in the Parliament and her legal background, Joyce was responsible for the advocacy of LGBTI+ rights policies and legal reform. She advocated for inclusive political participation and representation since 2018, and acted as the Deputy Executive Director of Taiwan Equality Campaign. She then takes the position as Executive Director in December 2022, leading Taiwan Equality Campaign on LGBTI+ rights advocacy.

Sebastian Lin(He/Him) is the Deputy Executive Director of Taiwan Equality Campaign (previously known as "Marriage Equality Coalition Taiwan".) He graduated from the Department of Social Work and double majored in Business Management at National Taipei University. Sebastian engaged in LGBTQ+ movement in Taiwan since 2011, and dedicated to LGBTQ+ rights, gender equity education, and creating LGBTQ+friendly workplaces.



During the 2018 national referendum in Taiwan, Sebastian played a key role in advocating for gender equity education, dispelling misconceptions, and facilitating connections among LGBTQ+-friendly educators nationwide. Since joining the Taiwan Equality Campaign in 2020, he has been responsible for speech coordination, advocacy training, corporate partnerships, LGBTQ+ inclusive workplace projects, and international collaborations.

Course Description:

Taiwan Equality Campaign is previously "Marriage Equality Coalition Taiwan," a task-oriented coalition formed by 5 different SOGI rights organizations in November 2016. The coalition integrated the power from civil society and dedicated to advocacy, social education, grassroots organizing and international collaboration. The coalition has officially registered as an independent organization, Taiwan Equality Campaign, in May 2020. Taiwan Equality Campaign continues the projects, including enhancing political participation of LGBTQ+ community, social education, and international collaboration, aiming at creating a discrimination-free society for LGBTQ+ community and making Taiwan an inclusive and friendly country. During the lecture, we would start from introducing our path of advocacy and all the lessons learned, and share our strategic thinking of social communication for LGBTI+ rights.

is a war hit zone between religious extremists and the army where people are living under a strong tribal, feudal system, based on patriarchy. During the course of her work she found out that in her home town of District Malakand 70% of school going girls who observe periods report to miss 24 school days per year which affects their education.

Eden Social Welfare Foundation was founded to serve persons with disabilities as well as other socially marginalized groups.



The Garden of **Hope Foundation**

The Garden of Hope Foundation (GOH) is a non-governmental, non-profit organization established in Taiwan in 1988. Starting from providing a safe haven for young girls caught up in the sex

industry and expanding to one of the largest organizations in Taiwan that provide services such as women's shelters, drop-in centers, counseling, temporary housing, employment training, social work, legal aid, and outreach programs.



Harmony Home Association, Taiwan

Harmony Home Taiwan is a non-profit organization established by Nicole Yang in 1986. Our mission is to provide shelter, care, treatment access, and support to people living with HIV/AIDS and their children in Taiwan. We have two service centers in Taiwan, and we offer care and housing services to about 100 individuals each year. Our services are provided to people with HIV, disabilities, recovering intravenous drug users, women with HIV released from prison, men who have sex with men, migrant workers, and foreigners with difficulties.

It also promotes the development of a six-level new agriculture, establishing a foundation for the self-sustaining economy of communities of small farmers.

The founder of the Kids' Bookhouse, Chen, Junlang(Chen Dad), returned to his hometown in 1999 to devote himself to children's education. He had offered daily after-school company, dinner, after-school tutoring and various diversified education, such as sports, music, programing, and etc. In 2019, Chen Dad passed away suddenly, but his genuine kindness created a circle that continues to involve more people, and this circle is still running. As of now, there are 8 book houses for after-school companion, 1 employment-training center opens to the public, and 1 home healthcare clinic. Their services cover 14 local communities, serving approximately 200 children per day, nearly 100 parents and the elderly, Over the past twenty years, Kid's Bookhouse has touched the lives of over 3,000 children.



One-Forty

One-Forty is a non-profit organization that strives to provide education for Southeast Asian migrant workers. Since 2015, we have been focusing on empowering

Southeast Asian migrant workers, by helping them acquire practical knowledge and skills throughout their journeys in Taiwan. We want to extend our influence to their lives back home, to give them the means of becoming financially independent. We wish to help them break out of the vicious circle of poverty. At One-Forty, we organize regular cultural exchanges, to offer consistent opportunities to the Taiwanese public and migrant workers to interact, communicate, and empathize with each other, and to bring them to recognize the stories and values of one another.
